

Daily Readings and Deepening

INTRODUCTION: *Approaching the threshold...*

One of the greatest pleasures for a human being is to commune intimately with loved ones. This can be a cause of great joy and happiness.


The same is true when we commune with God. We do so through prayer, which is speaking to God, and reading from the *Divine Verses*, which is listening to God. As we are about to discover, this intimate communication with God is the sole cause of spiritual transformation, and the most sought after goal of all, true happiness.

Bahá'u'lláh established an important requirement to help us with our spiritual communion. This requirement is to recite the “verses of God”, which are the Writings of Bahá'u'lláh,¹ each morning and evening with joy and radiance. This twice-daily discipline is considered necessary for the nourishment and health of one’s very soul.

The Universal House of Justice was asked if the Writings of the Báb or those of earlier Manifestations of God may be included as “verses of God” for the daily readings. The reply was that the believers are free to reach their own understanding on this question.² The Guardian wrote that this spiritual requirement was *not* met by reading his writings, or those of ‘Abdu’l-Bahá, however, their writings may be read after the required reading.³

Reciting the verses of God each morning and evening may be performed either silently or out loud.⁴

Deepening in the Faith is a separate practice. It requires one to continually read, meditate on, and study the Writings of the Báb, Bahá'u'lláh, ‘Abdu’l-Bahá, Shoghi Effendi and the Universal House of Justice. For the purpose of this study course, study, recitation or attentive reading from these Authors will be considered “deepening” in the Faith.



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OBJECTIVES: *A look to the horizon...*

Facilitator

Review the following objectives with the participants:

1. An objective of this study is to understand the fundamental verities or basic truths regarding the spiritual law to read or recite from the verses of God both morning and evening.
2. An objective of this study is to understand the fundamental verities or basic truths regarding the need for continual deepening in the Faith.

THE STUDY PROCESS: *Attaining the water of life...*

Facilitator

Review the following study process with the participants. Then study the numbered quotations on the following pages, one at a time as described below.

1. READING: *A drink from the cup of guidance...*

Have two participants take turns reading the quotation out loud so that it is read twice.

2. CONFIRMING MEANING: *A spray from the fountain of light...*

- If anyone would like to have better understanding of a word used in the quotation, now is the time to refer to its substitute phrase, definition or synonym, which can be found in the boxes below each quotation. Read the substitute phrase, definition or synonym out loud so everyone can hear.
- Read the sentence again that contains the word you selected, while **substituting for that word**, its given phrase, definition or synonym from the box below the quotation.
- If anyone would like a better understanding of another word, repeat the process above until everyone is satisfied with their understanding of the words in the quotation.

3. FINDING VALUE: *Mining the gems of truth...*

Take turns stating each basic fact or truth you can find in the quotation about daily readings or deepening in the Faith.

RECITING THE VERSES OF GOD EVERY MORNING AND EVENING

- Bahá'u'lláh has stated quite clearly in His Writings the essential requisites for our spiritual growth, and these are stressed again and again by 'Abdu'l-Bahá in His Talks and Tablets. One can summarize [one of] them briefly in this way: ... [1] The regular reading of the Sacred Scriptures, specifically at least each morning and evening, with reverence, attention and thought.

7. His advice to you is to continue deepening your knowledge and understanding of this Revelation, both by means of patient and thorough study of Bahá'í writings, and through active association with your fellow-believers and close participation in the activities of your local Bahá'í community.

APPLICATION: *Showing forth divine light...*

Facilitator

Read through the following paragraph together and proceed as stated. Then take time for the participants to write out their individual plans for action. When everyone has finished, move on to the closing reading.

Bahá'u'lláh wrote: “*It is incumbent upon every man of insight and understanding to strive to translate that which hath been written into reality and action....*” Imagine how the Bahá’í Teachings in this study class could be translated into reality and action. Take turns sharing the possibilities. Begin your statements with: “***One could....***”

From your experience in this study class on daily readings and deepening in the Faith, describe what ***you*** are inspired to put into reality and action. ***I will make conscious efforts to...***

A talk by `Abdu'l-Bahá to a Bible class in 1912...

I have been informed that the purpose of your class meeting is to study the significances and mysteries of the Holy Scriptures and understand the meaning of the divine Testaments. It is a cause of great happiness to me that you are turning unto the Kingdom of God, that you desire to approach the presence of God and to become informed of the realities and precepts of God. It is my hope that you may put forth your most earnest endeavor to accomplish this end, that you may investigate and study the Holy Scriptures word by word so that you may attain knowledge of the mysteries hidden therein. Be not satisfied with words, but seek to understand the spiritual meanings hidden in the heart of the words. ... It is difficult to comprehend even the words of a philosopher; how much more

difficult it is to understand the Words of God. The divine Words are not to be taken according to their outer sense. They are symbolical and contain realities of spiritual meaning. For instance, in the book of Solomon's songs you will read about the bride and bridegroom. It is evident that the physical bride and bridegroom are not intended. Obviously, these are symbols conveying a hidden and inner significance. In the same way the Revelations of St. John are not to be taken literally, but spiritually. These are the mysteries of God. It is not the reading of the words that profits you; it is the understanding of their meanings. Therefore, pray God that you may be enabled to comprehend the mysteries of the divine Testaments.

Consider the symbolical meanings of the Words and teachings of Christ. He said, "*I am the living bread which came down from heaven; if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever.*" When the Jews heard this, they took it literally and failed to understand the significance of His meaning and teaching. The spiritual truth which Christ wished to convey to them was that the reality of Divinity within Him was like a blessing which had come down from heaven and that he who partook of this blessing should never die. That is to say, bread was the symbol of the perfections which had descended upon Him from God, and he who ate of this bread, or endowed himself with the perfections of Christ, would undoubtedly attain to everlasting life. The Jews did not understand Him, and taking the words literally, said, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Had they understood the real meaning of the Holy Book, they would have become believers in Christ.

All the texts and teachings of the holy Testaments have intrinsic spiritual meanings. They are not to be taken literally. I, therefore, pray in your behalf that you may be given the power of understanding these inner real meanings of the Holy Scriptures and may become informed of the mysteries deposited in the words of the Bible so that you may attain eternal life and that your hearts may be attracted to the Kingdom of God. May your souls be illumined by the light of the Words of God, and may you become repositories of the mysteries of God, for no comfort is greater and no happiness is sweeter than spiritual comprehension of the divine teachings. If a man understands the real meaning of a poet's verses such as those of Shakespeare, he is pleased and rejoiced. How much greater his joy and pleasure when he perceives the reality of the Holy Scriptures and becomes informed of the mysteries of the Kingdom!

I pray that the divine blessings may descend upon you day by day, that your hearts may be opened to perceive the inner significances of the Word of God. There is no fruit in knowing the mere letters of the Book. ... I pray that you may be quickened by the breaths of the Holy Spirit and illumined by the rays of the Sun of Truth. May you be favored with heavenly blessings in the threshold of God and attain to eternal life. This is my prayer. May God bless and enlighten you.
