Recitation of the Greatest Name

INTRODUCTION: Approaching the threshold...

Compared with Dispensations of the past, the Bahá'í Faith has very little ritual, formality or ceremony. The few prescribed forms of worship remaining are outward expressions that aid with our inward spiritual training. For the spiritual development of the individual, Bahá'u'lláh has instituted certain spiritual disciplines and laws. One such discipline is for the individual to repeat, in an attitude of prayerful devotion, the Greatest Name of God ninety-five times each day. Shoghi Effendi wrote through his secretary: "*Reciting*' the Greatest Name means to repeat it over and over, silently or out loud...."¹ The Greatest Name of God to be repeated ninety-five times each day is "Alláh-u-Abhá". Translated from the Arabic it means "God is All-Glorious" or "God is Most Glorious".

In Islám there is a tradition that among the various names or attributes of God, one is the greatest. However, by Islámic tradition, the identity of that Name is considered hidden. Bahá'u'lláh revealed that the Greatest Name of God is "Bahá", which means "Glory", "Splendor" or "Light". This means that Bahá'u'lláh, the supreme Manifestation of God, has appeared in the Station of God's Greatest Name, that is, in His highest or most excellent attribute. There are several forms of the Greatest Name, all of which are derivatives of the name "Bahá", such as "Abhá", as well as certain phrases such as "Alláh-u-Abhá", "Yá Bahá'u'lláh", or "Yá Bahá'u'l-Abhá".

"Yá Bahá'u'l-Abhá" is an invocation that can be translated either as "O Glory of Glories" or "O Glory of the All-Glorious". "Yá Bahá'u'lláh" means "O Glory of God", "O Splendor of God" or "O Light of God".

OBJECTIVE: A look to the horizon...

Facilitator

Review the following objective with the participants:

The objective of this study is to understand the fundamental verities or basic truths regarding the importance of recitation of the Greatest Name of God ninety-five times a day.

THE STUDY PROCESS: Attaining the water of life...

Facilitator

Review the following study process with the participants. Then study the numbered quotations that follow, one at a time as described below.

- READING: A drink from the cup of guidance...
 A. Read the quotation out loud in its entirety.
- 2. CONFIRMING MEANING: A spray from the fountain of light...

To better understand certain words used in the quotation, take turns with the following:

- **A**. Each participant **choose a word** from the quotation and **state it** for the whole group to hear. (Like a fun game pick a word!) Then...
- **B**. Read out loud the sentence that contains the **word** you selected, **while substituting for that word**, its given phrase, definition, or synonym from the boxes below the quotation.
- C. Repeat A and B above until everyone is satisfied with their understanding of the words.
- **3. FINDING VALUE:** *Mining the gems of truth...*
 - A. Read the quotation out loud again in its entirety.
 - **B**. Take turns **stating each basic fact or truth** you can find in the quotation about **recitation of the Greatest Name of God.**

QUOTATIONS: Within the meadows of Thy nearness...

1. It hath been ordained that every believer in God, the Lord of Judgement, shall, each day, having washed his hands and then his face, seat himself and, turning unto God, repeat "Alláh-u-Abhá" ninety-five times. SOME QUESTIONS: A cup from the showers of confirmation...

Facilitator

Ask the participants to answer the following questions. They can usually find answers in the quotations just studied or in the introduction. When everyone has finished, review the questions, then share and discuss the answers.

- 1. Bahá'ís are to repeat the Greatest Name of God, "Alláh-u-Abhá", ______ times every day.
- 2. The repetition of "Alláh-u-Abhá" is to be preceded by the performance of ablutions. If one has already performed ablutions for an Obligatory Prayer and wants to proceed with repetition of the Greatest Name, an additional ablution is not necessary. If one has just bathed and is preparing to repeat the Greatest Name, ablutions must be performed. If there is no water available for ablutions Bahá'ís are to instead repeat five times the words, "*In the Name of God, the Most Pure, the Most Pure,*" and then proceed with repetition of the Greatest Name.¹ Ablutions are...

- 6. Traditionally around the world, believers of various religions have used a string of beads to count specific verses or chants during devotional practices. An individual Bahá'í wrote Shoghi Effendi about the use of prayer beads to keep count while repeating the Greatest Name of God. He responded through his secretary: "As regards the repeating of the Greatest Name ninety-five times, this also has been mentioned by Bahá'u'lláh but He has given no directions as to how the prayer beads should be used in this connection."¹ This counsel leaves the Bahá'ís free to decide for themselves whether to use prayer beads to keep count during recitation of the Greatest Name.

Some believers use another way to keep count: Using the tip of your thumb, touch on the same hand the tip and then successively the three knuckles on the palm side of each finger, counting to 16. Then, use your pointing finger to touch and count the tip and two knuckles of your thumb. That's 19! Stick one finger out on your other hand, and repeat. When all five fingers are out you're finished.

Take turns sharing the possibilities. Begin your statements with: "One could...." Suggest as many ideas as you want.

2. **DECIDING ACTION:** *Mirroring forth a beam of light...*

From your experience in this study class on Recitation of the Greatest Name, describe what *you* are inspired to put into reality and action. *I will make conscious efforts to...*

O my Lord! Thou beholdest them clinging to the rope of Thy grace and holding fast unto the hem of the mantle of Thy beneficence.
